HEAD OF ENFORCEMENT QUARTERLY REPORT – 1ST FEBRUARY 2017 TO 30TH APRIL 2017

Introduction

Patch Summary

1. A patch summary for the quarter is given in the table below:

General Update

2. General points

- HoE attended a National Inshore Marine Enforcement Group (NIMEG) meeting
- IFCOs assisted the science team with Cockle/mussel surveys and small fish surveys
- IFCO Moulton gave a talk to Port of Manchester Port Health Special Interest Group
- Southern IFCOs underwent net measurement training

3. Staff

- IFCOs Brownrigg, Sparks and Walters were all inducted onto the accreditation scheme on the 13th April and have started working through the modules of unit one

 finally working towards a QCF Level 3 Certificate in Fisheries and Marine Enforcement
- HoE continued to attend standardisation meetings as part of his Quality Assessor (QA) role within the accreditation scheme
- IFCO job plans were agreed in early February following appraisals in January

Byelaw Review

- 4. Officers have begun working on the review of Byelaw 3. While the current Byelaw 3 represents significant progress from previous byelaws officers have identified areas that could be improved:
 - Addressing the lack of dynamism in Byelaw 3. A flexible permit scheme that is now available to IFCAs appears to be the only mechanism for this
 - The fixed "commercial areas" (Ribble and North Morecambe) don't offer district coverage when and where required
 - The current Byelaw 3 does not regulate those buying Cockles and Mussels and officers feel this merits consideration
- 5. An internal consultation with IFCOs was conducted during the quarter.
- 6. A paper was presented to the Technical Science and Byelaws (TSB) Sub-Committee on the 16th May and the following was approved by members:
 - The time table for reviewing the byelaw given in the table below
 - Consultation with all stakeholders prior to officers recommending measures to members at the TSB on the 8th August

- 7. A consultation with all stakeholders was started on the 7th June and will run until the 2nd July. This consultation is web based and consults on the following areas:
 - Permit numbers
 - Management of the permit system
 - The charge for the permit
 - Support workers
 - Entry of young people into the industry
 - Safety certification in the new byelaw
 - Regulation of buyers
 - Management of the 5kg personal consumption limits
 - Methods of hand gathering
 - Management of riddling within the new byelaw

NWIFCA Byelaw 3 Permits

- 8. The current Byelaw 3 permit numbers are:
 - 121 in total (101 currently issued and 18 requiring renewal)
 - 2 waiting list spaces under offer

Specific Fishery Report

Cockle Fisheries

- 12. Two specific Cockle fisheries ran during the quarter:
 - The Pilling and Leven Cockle fisheries which have been open since 7th November 2016 (total of 175 days)
 - Both were open for the duration of the quarter and stopped on the 30th April as the closed season started
 - The Pilling fishery saw very low levels of activity from the very start. This was due to a 0combination of relatively low stock levels, MLS issues on the first day and a bird flu outbreak in the locality
 - The Leven cockle fishery saw sustained but moderate levels of activity for the duration

Bass

- 14. The regulation (article 10 of Council Regulation 2017/127) was in force during the quarter and the relevant limits were:
 - Recreational catches from the shore/vessels were catch release
 - Commercial catches from the shore were prohibited
 - HoE/IFCOs liaised with the MMO regarding licensed vessel authorisations which were as follows:
 - Trawl by-catch 3% by weight of unavoidable by-catch
 - 250kg unavoidable by-catch per month for fixed gill nets
 - 10t per month for vessels using hook and lines (1st April-31st Dec)
 - A reference period of the 1st July 2015 to the 30th September 2016 is being used for the issuing of the authorisation
 - HoE is unable to update members on numbers or which vessels have which authorisations

Shore Based Activity Report

- 15. A summary of shore based activity is given in the table below. Areas the IFCOs focused on this quarter were:
 - Cockle enforcement at the Leven specifically focused on MLS and authorised area compliance – both ATV and shore based
 - High number of shore patrols with respect to the Bass regulations were conducted
 - ATV patrols were focused on Leven compliance and assisting with shellfish hygiene sample runs and scientific surveys
 - No ATV patrols were possible in the northern district due to the IFCOs assisting as crew on the Solway Protector
