General Update

- Five IFCO's attended the Torquay enforcement training course in January. The week long course gives officers a strong footing in marine fisheries enforcement and allows them to be issued with their warrants to carry out their core functions as officers.
- Byelaw 26/27 permits for the estuarine boxes expired on the 30th of November.

- Officers have been renewing safety certificates and completing training during the quieter winter months.
- The Intel project has been continuing with IFCO Waltho taking over as the Intel Officer based in Carnforth. Bi Weekly tasking & Coordination meetings are held and monthly meetings across the Northern Marine Area. This is leading to strategically led tasking of officers on intelligence led enforcement.
- IFCO Sirkett who is based in Whitehaven has been appointed permanently and will be completing training as an engineer.
- IFCO's Brownrigg and Sparks are progressing through the Officer Accreditation Scheme.

NIMEG

Head of Enforcement attended the quarterly meeting of the National Inshore Marine Enforcement Group in November. A number of important issues were discussed.

- Amongst which all organisations agreed to use personal checks for new IFCO recruits.
- All attendees were in agreement that all IFCAs should use standardised compliance forms such as fisheries inspection forms and manual of guidance forms for producing prosecution case files.
- It was recommended that organisations incorporate formal cautions into their sanctions policy.

Health and Safety

Operations Manager and Head of Enforcement held a meeting with the Authority's H&S contractor in January. Discussions centred on the continued process of risk profiling the activities of NWIFCA.

A number of risk assessments have been reviewed and amended when required in this quarter and it was decided to develop a spreadsheet to log any lone working to check the buddy system was being utilised.

There were no reportable near misses, accidents or incidents this quarter.

Legislative changes

EU BASS regulations 2018

The European Union Council regulation 2019/120 was published in January fixing for this year the fishing opportunities for certain fish stocks and groups of fish stocks in Union waters. Within the regulation article 9 imposes the regulations on fishing for European seabass *Dicentrarchus labrax* for this year.

The following measures are included and apply to commercial vessels that have been issued authorisations (having demonstrated recorded catches between July 2015 and September 2016);

- No Bass fishing using any gear in February and March.
- Vessels using demersal trawls are limited to unavoidable by- catches not exceeding 100kg per month and 1% of the weight of the total catches of that day.
- Vessels using hooks and lines are not to exceed 5 tonnes per year.
- Vessels using Fixed gillnets are limited to unavoidable bycatch not exceeding 1.2 tonnes per year.

It is prohibited to commercially fish for seabass from the shore.

Recreational fisheries for seabass are catch and release only for the entire year.

Enforcement will be carried out by NWIFCA Officers in accordance with the compliance directive supplied by the Marine Management Organisation.

West Kirby and Thurstaton Mussel Fishery

Science surveys identified a large stock of undersize mussels at the end of the summer. A small amount of good size mussel was identified in some deep gullies. A significant amount of interest was received regarding this stock as there is a good market demand for size mussel. 11 Dee transitional permits have been issued based on the criteria that fisherman could demonstrate that they had fished mussels in the Dee Estuary. Fishermen have accessed the fishery for limited catches throughout the winter.

Cockle Fisheries

Pilling Cockle fishery

Effort at the Pilling cockle fishery began to increase through the festive period with upwards of 30 Byelaw 3 permit holders prosecuting the fishery each day. Minimum landing size inspections conducted by IFCO's have encountered good size cockle.

Flookburgh Cockle Fishery

The Flookburgh cockle bed has seen the most consistent effort throughout this cockle season. Effort has continued regularly with a dip in the New Year as market forces leaned towards the Pilling fishery. IFCO Dixon has maintained a good level of cover at the fishery inspecting permits and conducting minimum landing size inspections

Leasowe Cockle Fishery

The Leasowe cockle bed has only seen sporadic interest from Byelaw 3 permit holders through this quarter. Far less landings have been reported than the other commercial beds. This is believed to be because of the thinning of the bed. It is thought that the cockle stock may re aggregate in the spring.

Byelaw 3 returns

- Submission of Byelaw 3 returns dropped significantly in the autumn
- As a result there has been a significant compliance drive in November and December.
- 15 sanctions were issued during November for failure to supply returns for October and 17 in November including one permit suspension for continued failure to supply (rescinded in January after returns supplied). Two Official Warning Letters were issued in January.
- Sanctions have been escalated from advisory letters to official warning letters. There are a number of permit holders who will have their permit suspended on the next occasion they fail to supply permits. Other sanctions such as FAPs may be considered.
- Anthony Graham and HoE are working towards drafting a specific compliance strategy for the returns.
- Before the festive period in an effort to again encourage the submitting of returns a text message reminder was scheduled for early January.
